This Week in ELA Grades 6-8...

Sixth Grade closely read and analyzed the short story, "Priscilla and the Wimps" by Richard Peck. We read and analyzed poetry, and we read our Independent Reading (IR) books. We also continued closely reading and analyzing nonfiction paired-text articles, "How Candy Conquered America" from Scholastic *Scope*. We drafted essays comparing paired texts, we practiced writing text-dependent paragraphs, and we responded to January choice board writing prompts. We also read nonfiction texts on Newsela and completed paragraph responses. We continued drafting and revising vignettes about our favorite month. We continued Wordly Wise Lesson 5 activities, and our tests will be Thursday, January 16th. We also practiced cursive writing. Our "Dog Breeds" research projects are underway. Assignments are posted in Google Classroom.



ELA Grades 6-8...

Middle School English Language Arts Curriculum is aligned to the New Jersey Student Learning Standards for English Language Arts. We use the workshop model of instruction in both reading and writing. Students read and write across a wide variety of genres as well as study the effective uses of writing, mechanics, and grammar. The curriculum supports, encourages, and facilitates choice/independent reading that allows students to pursue topics and genres of interests. The curriculum also embeds text activities and literacy experiences that engage students in reading partnerships and deep, thoughtful discussions.

Sixth Grade texts include read alouds, poetry, nonfiction articles from Newsela and Scholastic *Scope* magazine, fiction texts, short stories, and the novels *Hoot*, by Carl Hiaasen and *Wonder*, by RJ Palacio.

Seventh Grade texts include read alouds, poetry, nonfiction articles from Newsela and Scholastic *Scope* magazine, fiction texts, short stories, and the novels *The Giver*, by Lois Lowry, *Holes* by Louis Sachar, and (possibly) *Drums, Girls, and Dangerous Pie*, by Jordan Sonnenblick.

Eighth Grade texts include read alouds, poetry, nonfiction articles from Newsela and Scholastic *Scope* magazine, fiction texts, short stories, and the novels *The Outsiders*, by S.E. Hinton, *The Gospel According to Larry* by Janet Tashjian, and *Sleeping Freshmen Never Lie* by David Lubar, and (possibly) *Drums, Girls, and Dangerous Pie*, by Jordan Sonnenblick.
